### THE SCHOOL

The Lisbon School of Architecture offers courses leading to undergraduate, master's and doctoral degrees in the fields of Architecture, Urban Planning, Building Interiors and Renovation, Design and Fashion. It also offers non-degree courses that provide complementary training to professionals who wish to acquire more in-depth knowledge.

This wide range of training makes the Lisbon School of Architecture the largest and most diversified school in the country in its fields, with about 3 thousand students. It is also the school with the largest number of foreign exchange students from Europe, but also from countries in other continents with which the school has exchange agreements.

Its main characteristic is the training through the projects in the first- and second-level degree programs, where the knowledge acquired in all subjects is applied in the design of objects that can go from small scale to city scale.

Currently, the school is committed to training professionals capable of working in society, contributing to increase their potential for innovation, competitiveness and exports. For this reason, it favours the development of final projects and scientific dissertations in collaboration with public and private entities, fostering entrepreneurship and creating future opportunities for students.

Third-level degree training is aimed at advanced research in the three subject areas of the school, within the framework of the CIAUD, its research centre, rated "Very Good" [high honours] by the Foundation for Science and Technology.

As a modern school that tries to combine tradition and innovation, Lisbon School of Architecture is a reference institution in the professional training of architects, urban planners and designers, as well as in the production of socially recognized specialized and interdisciplinary research.



### **MANAGEMENT**

The school is run by four councils. The Management Board is headed by the President who oversees the institution, with a special focus on financial aspects. The Scientific Board manages the intellectual aspects of academic life, such as the approval of courses, curricular units, regulations and scientific commissions. The Pedagogical Council handles the academic calendar and assessment of training, teachers and students. The School Board approves statutes, plans and activity reports, including the budget, and supervises their implementation.

### **ORGANIZATION**

### SCIENTIFIC

The school is organized into two scientific departments: Architectural Projects, Urban Planning and design department and Social Sciences, Arts and Humanities Department. Each of these departments is divided into sections corresponding to the disciplinary areas. The first has four sections - Architecture, Urban Planning, Design and Technologies - and the second, three - Design, Geometry and Computing; History and Theory; And Social and Territory Sciences.

### **ADMINISTRATION**

The school is also organized into three administrative divisions: the Academic Division, which deals with student records and is described in detail as Academic Services; the Financial Division, which manages the budget and finances of the School; and the Administrative Division, which takes care of human resources and work hours. To complement these services, the institution has support offices in several areas.

# FIRST LEVEL UNDERGRADUATE DEGREES

The school offers *licenciatura* (undergraduate) courses in Design and Fashion Design courses, each lasting 3 years (180 ECTS).

Lecturing timetable: daytime Years: 3 · Semesters: 6 ECTS credits: 180

### **DESIGN**

The Design course is focused on small scale - hand and gesture - projects, and aimed at the resolution of human problems involving objects, object systems, and services, and whether these can be interpreted, be they equipment, products, communication objects, environments, etc.

The undergraduate degree in Design confers skills both in product design and in graphic design, allowing the professional practice or the pursuit of studies in any of the subject areas.

There is also a great deal of relevance to design, technology and service design.

### **FASHION DESIGN**

The undergraduate degree prepares students for a theoretical and practical understanding of fashion design, considering the areas of accessories, styling and costumes. Design, illustration and materials are also considered important.

### ARCHITECTURAL STUDIES

The integrated master's degree in Architecture includes both first- and second-level courses. The first level corresponds to the undergraduate degree in Architectural Studies and aims to provide students with basic and comprehensive training.

During their studies, students work on human creations where scientific, humanistic and artistic forms of thought and expression are linked to the natural and artificial environment, which we designate as the space inhabited by the human being.

### SECOND LEVEL

### INTEGRATED MASTERS

Integrated master's degree in Architecture courses are offered in Urban Planning and in Building Interiors and Renovation, with a total of 5 years (3+2) of studies, with a total of 300 ECTS. The three confer professional degrees accredited by the Order of Portuguese Architects and by the European Union, and are conducive to a masters' degree.

Students may enter during the first or second level, having completed a degree in the Lisbon School of Architecture or other similar educational institutions.

### **ARCHITECTURE**

During these years, students are prepared for the design, renovation and remodelling of buildings, group of buildings, urban public spaces, land-scape and territory.

### **URBAN PLANNING**

The specialization in urban planning completes the training in a field directed to complex territorial problems, focussing on the urban space and the territory, framed in cities and urban agglomerations, metropolitan areas, landscapes and territories of regional scope.

### BUILDING INTERIORS AND RENOVATION

The specialization in interiors aims at the redefinition and the repurposing of pre-existing spaces, through a comprehensive and broad vision of several subject areas.

### NON-INTEGRATED MASTERS

The Lisbon School of Architecture offers Masters in Product Design, Communication Design and Fashion Design, each of which lasts for two years (120 ECTS). Students complete the degree by submitting a final project, dissertation or internship, produced during the 2nd semester of the 2nd year.

### COMMUNICATION DESIGN

This master's degree prepares students with a series of values in different areas of design: graphic, editorial, interaction, information, multimedia. In addition, it gives students a sense of communication, conception and design that enables them to prepare themselves for the future of their profession.

### **FASHION DESIGN**

The master's degree in Fashion design aims to develop a personal vision of the fashion world by means of the consolidation of knowledge and design, reflexive, creative and critical skills, within a framework of experimentation and versatility. There is a complexity of projects, which can be separate, coordinated or collections; accessories; research portfolios and sources of inspiration, illustrations, photo shoots and project presentations.

### PRODUCT DESIGN

The master's degree in product design aims to specialize its students in the design and construction of products, from small to large scale, considering processes and concepts such as sustainability, branding, entrepreneurship, engineering and business design. In the post-industrial era, the project's mission is to humanize the framework of society, without compromising the biodiversity and well-being of future generations. In this sense, the concepts of global design and strategic design are called upon and the importance of branding that characterizes, distinguishes and communicates successful products and services is recognized.

### JOINT MASTERS

There are also two European Master's programs in collaboration with foreign schools: the Master in Sustainable Planning in the Mediterranean World is offered in collaboration with Università deli Studi di Sassari (UniSS), Italy, and the Universidad de Alcalá de Henares, Madrid, Spain; While the Master's in Planning and Policies for Environment, Landscape and City is offered in collaboration with Università di Venezia (IUAV) and Università degli Studi di Sassari (UniSS), Italy, and also with Universitat de Girona (UdG) and with the Universitat Autonoma de Barcelona (UAB), Spain.



# THIRD LEVEL DOCTORATE

Years: 3 (máx. 5) · Semesters: 6 (máx. 10) ECTS credits: 180

The school has three doctoral, or third-level programs. The doctoral course in Architecture is composed of the areas of expertise: Theory and Practice of Planning, History and Theory, Technology and Construction Management, Conservation and Renovation, Design, and Computing. The doctorate in Urban Planning addresses issues related to urban planning, design and management, but does not have separate areas of expertise. This is also the case for the doctorate in Design, which covers the areas of product, communication and fashion.

The three doctoral programs include a curricular year corresponding to 60 ECTS, followed by a minimum of two and a maximum of four years of research totalling 180 ECTS.

One year of studies includes two mandatory curricular units of 10 ECTS each, namely, Research Methodologies in the 1st semester and the Thesis Project Seminar in the 2nd. It also includes 20 ECTS of optional curricular units in each semester. One should bear in mind that at least half of these credits must be obtained in optional curricular units in the specialization area in which the student is enrolled. The other half can be divided and secured through curricular units from other areas and even from other educational institutions.

In the remaining years, students carry out their own research, under the supervision of their mentors, either independently or in the context of existing research projects

### ADVANCED STUDY PROGRAMS

The school's training offer also includes advanced one-year study programs in several areas, including Vernacular Architecture, Portuguese Urban Culture, Applied Computing Architecture, Urban Planning and Design, and Conservation and Renovation. These programs are offered annually.

Advanced research programs have been designed with a structure similar to the first year of doctoral programs in order to facilitate the transition to students wishing to pursue advanced masters or doctoral degrees by developing a thesis in at least one or two years, respectively.

### INTENSIVE AND SHORT TERM COURSES

The school also has intensive short-course programs in specialized areas, aimed at professionals who wish to keep abreast of the latest advances in architecture, urban planning and design.

The Lisbon School of Architecture also offers PhD Double degrees with a few foreign universities. These degrees are developed in the frame of the RETHINK project funded by the TEMPUS programme of the European Commission.

### **POST-DOCTORAL STUDIES**

The school accepts researchers who wish to pursue their post-doctoral studies, supervised by one of their professors or researchers, as part of an existing research group, or within the scope of an ongoing project.

### LANGUAGE OF INSTRUCTION

Classes are taught in Portuguese or English, according to the number of international students in class. Many teachers are also fluent in other languages, such as Spanish, Italian, French or German, which facilitates communication with foreign students, particularly in orientation or mentoring situations.

### **FACULTY BODY**

The Lisbon School of Architecture includes 171 teachers, including architects, urban planners, designers, economists, geographers, sociologists, art historians, artists and engineers. 142 of which have a PhD, one-third of which were awarded by a foreign university. In addition, a significant number of project teachers have their own professional practice, through which they are awarded. These combined aspects provide a rich and diverse learning environment with strong links to the everyday context of the professions and the labour market.





### **APPLICATIONS**

Degree applications are made through a national competition open to Portuguese or foreign students. The registration process takes place in July and is managed by the Ministry of Education and limited by numerus clausus.

Applications for second-level programs - integrated masters and non-integrated degrees - and for the third-level programs - doctorates and advance study courses - have their own different application deadlines, the first in April and the last in August. International students can apply annually, within a period to be defined by the the school, through the graduate office portal.

Applications for post-doctoral studies may be submitted at any time and must be supported by the researcher with whom the candidate wishes to work.



### **ACADEMIC YEAR**

The school year begins in early September. The first two weeks of the first semester are reserved for orientation and registration. The classes start in the third week and run through Christmas. The regular exams season is in January. The first two weeks of February are reserved for 2nd semester registration. The classes start in the third week of February and extend through the end of May. In June, it is regular exams season. July is reserved for the time of resource and improvement examination and for the special season intended only for athletes, student-workers and finalists.

The teaching period of each semester has an average duration of 14 weeks.



### **TUITION FEES**

Tuition fees are around € 1,064.00 per year for undergraduate and graduate degree programs; € 3,500.00 for two years of non-integrated masters and € 6,500.00 for the three years of doctoral programs. For international students, the tuition fee is € 7,000 per year.

Students who fail to complete their course within the expected number of years will have to pay extra tuition for each additional semester. The annual fees can be paid in 3, 4 or 10 instalments, according to the payment plan adopted, with the 10-instalment plan intended for students with proven financial difficulties. Tuition fees must be paid at the time of registration and in the tenth week of classes or monthly, depending on the payment plan. Failure to comply with these rules will automatically cancel the student's enrolment.

### FINANCIAL AID

Financial aid is limited, although the students in first- and second-level programs residing in Portugal can apply for a grant from the Social Action Services. The deadline for registration is in September, with the decision announced in early December.

Third-level students can apply for a study bursary from the Science and Technology Foundation (FCT) or from other funding agencies (Fundação Oriente, Fundação Calouste Gulbenkian, etc.). Usually, these scholarships cover tuition and living expenses.





# CENTRES AND OFFICIES LIBRARY AND CARTOGRAPHY CENTRE

The Lisbon School of Architecture has a library specializing in architecture, urban planning and design which also contains many works from related areas, such as engineering and the arts. The institution students have access to the libraries of other schools in the university and to an inter-library loan system that allows them to order works from other university libraries in the country.

Within the library, there is a cartography centre that provides the FA community access to a wide range of historical and contemporary cartographic information on Portugal and Portuguese speaking countries, both on paper and in digital format.

### ADITIONAL FACILITIES

#### WORKSHOPS

The Lisbon School of Architecture has one of the largest workshops installed in schools of this kind in Portugal, which includes carpentry, locksmith and ceramics. These facilities are used by students to produce models and prototypes of their projects.

# ARCHITECTURE, URBAN PLANNING AND DESIGN RESEARCH CENTRE (CIAUD)

CIAUD is part of the Lisbon School of Architecture and is the only research centre based in an architectural school in Portugal. It includes 180 researchers and doctoral students from various schools both inside and outside ULisboa as well as the school. It is organized into four nuclei, three of which correspond to the school's scientific expectations - architecture, urban planning and design while the other corresponds to the scientific area of ergonomics. The research is organized along several lines of the four nuclei, thus promoting interdisciplinary research.

The scientific output of the CIAUD can be measured by the number of articles in journals and conference proceedings, and by books published by its researchers at an international level. The CIAUD also supports the organization of conferences, seminars and workshops by its members, which contribute to the creation of a dynamic and international scientific environment in the school.

### RESEARCH GROUPS

Teachers, researchers and students organize themselves in groups to actively collaborate in the development of research in a particular area of knowledge. These groups coordinate with masters, doctorates, research (CIAUD) and consultancy (CPS), which provide an adequate framework for the development of theses, fundamental and applied research, and specialized advisory services. These groups have a significant history of research projects and publications, collaborating with other national and international congeners.

### RESEARCH LABORATORIES

The School of Architecture has several specialized laboratories with advanced equipment, each of which is coordinated by a researcher appointed to take care of its operation, maintenance and expansion. These laboratories work closely with research groups, doctoral programs and masters, and research and service centres to support the development of theses and projects. Laboratories are available for use by the school's academic and scientific community, but also by the outside community.


There are several buses with a destination or stop at the Ajuda Campus:

### WHERE TO EAT?

There are several places where students can eat, both at school and nearby. The school has a snack bar offering fast meals and lunches, and there is also a university canteen across the street serving full meals at subsidized prices. The canteen offers three options: meat, fish and ovo-lacto vegetarian meals. A university restaurant, used for more formal dining, is located on the top floor of the same building.

In addition, students and staff from the Lisbon School of Architecture can use meal spaces from other schools on the campus or choose from a wide variety of restaurants located in the nearby Ajuda neighbourhood.

### WHERE TO PRACTICE SPORTS?

There is a sports pavilion (CEDAR) on campus that offers a wide variety of sports facilities. Students and staff also have access to facilities at other university locations, including the Estádio Universitário in Campo Grande.

### WHERE TO FIND ACCOMODATION?

There is no accommodation on campus, although a residence is planned to be built beginning in 2014. The university has several residences scattered throughout Lisbon, although these are not enough to satisfy the demand. Consequently, students often rent rooms in private homes or apartments together with other students.

Entry to Portugal does not require any vaccination, unless the students come from a geographical area at risk.

Students who are from outside the EU must take out travel/sickness insurance for the duration of the travel period and a copy of the policy is required to allow them to join the FA.


